Tuesday, October 3 - Young Canada Day at the Norfolk County Fair – has been designated as a Professional Activity day by the Grand Erie District School Board. Except for scheduled events (like the Road Race), there will be no supervision of elementary students on this day. Students will be admitted free to the Fair on Young Canada Day and do not require a pass to enter the fairgrounds.

Waterford Pumpkinfest:

We are happy to accept snacks and treats for special occasions (birthdays, Hallowe'en etc.). However, the Ontario Public Health Association no longer supports home baked or prepared food for students; therefore, food sent to school has to be purchased from a recognized facility that has been approved by public health inspectors. This means that we can no longer have bake sales at school, nor can we give students cupcakes, cookies etc. that have been made in private kitchens. We can only accept pre-packaged, purchased treats from grocery stores on special days. Please remember that we are a nut aware school.

MILK BAG MATS FOR THIRD WORLD COUNTRIES

***** Last year we collected 6950 bags! ***** Help us reach 7000+ this year!! ***(6950 bags = 18 mats for kids or 11 mats for adults)

You can save milk bags from going to landfill and provide sleeping mats for children and adults in third world countries! Waterford Public School would like your help with a non-profit project; please save your milk bags and send them with your child to school. These are the large, colourful outer bags that milk comes in. * Please make sure they are clean and completely dry. *

The bags are flattened, counted, bundled into groups of fifty and passed along to a dedicated group of senior citizens in Brantford. The group cuts each bag into measured strips, ties the ends together and rolls them into balls. More volunteers then weave the knotted strips into mats. Finished mats are packed in boxes to be shipped to missions sending much-needed donations to impoverished countries overseas. Because the mats are lightweight, they can be used as packing material in shipments of other supplies.

Mats are handed out to children and adults alike. Not only do they provide a softer, more comfortable bed than sleeping on the hard, damp ground, they also help keep disease-causing bugs away and are easy to wash. During the aftermath of the Haiti earthquake in January 2010, over 600 mats were handed out from one shipment in just two days! Medical teams even used them as surgical beds and linens, washing and reusing them over and over. Imagine how welcome these mats will be to the thousands of people affected by the most recent hurricanes!

It takes over 350 bags to make one child-size sleeping mat and over 600 bags for an adult-sized one. Many hours are spent cutting, tying and rolling the bags into balls. Many more are used to weave the 'plarn' (plastic yarn) into mats. This is a long-term group effort, involving dozens of dedicated volunteers of all ages, like YOU!

Please join us in our mission to provide a cleaner, safer sleeping place for those in need by donating your plastic milk bags to our school! Thank you!


Free Clothes Closet:

Gearing Up to Go Skating:

We are so fortunate to have an arena within walking distance of our school, and schedules are now in the works for another fantastic skating season here at WPS! There are no fees for students to participate in our skating program, but they do require:

- A signed permission form
- Skates (no boots or shoes are allowed on the ice)
- A CSA approved helmet.

If your child does not have a pair of skates or helmet to wear, we have various sizes available at the school for them to borrow on their skating days! Please let your child's teacher know so that we can get them sized up 2

In order to run a successful skating programme, we rely on the support of volunteers—especially in our primary grades. There are always lots of skates to tie, and new skaters to encourage on the ice, so we definitely welcome the assistance! Volunteers must have a current Vulnerable Sector Police Check in order to help at skating, as well as a pair of skates if you are joining us on the ice. We look forward to seeing you at the arena!

Our skating program will begin in November, so stay tuned for more information.

Volunteers for School Trips:

We love to have parents and guardians join us for class trips. Sometimes, depending on the venue and the amount of the room on a bus, we are not able to take all the helpers who wish to go. We do our best to give parents ample opportunity to participate throughout the school year. We sometimes do a draw if there are too many helpers for a specific trip. We ask that parents and guardians do not bring younger siblings when helping, so volunteers can give their full attention to the pupils in the class.

Head Lice:

Even though it is very common, many parents have never dealt with head lice and are not sure what to look for. You may be frustrated and confused by the myths about it and not sure how to treat it. Head lice are tiny, greyish insects that live and breed on human hair. Nits and eggs appear as tiny white specks attached to individual hair shafts. They cannot jump, fly or be spread by pets.

Please check your child regularly. Please notify our school office if you find that your child has head lice. We understand parents' and students' need for confidentiality but we are obliged to inform parents of other students in the same class of the presence of head lice. Once head lice are found, students may not return to school until they have received proper treatment and all nits have been removed from the hair. Parents must bring their child to the office to be checked by a school staff member prior to returning to class.

Mrs. Opersko is looking for parent volunteers to assist with lice checks. Our school health nurse will provide training. Please fill in the attachment to this newsletter and return it to the office if you can help.

Strong Start:

We are fortunate to have support from our community to offer a unique program called Letters, Sounds and Words. Volunteers from our community help children aged five to seven learn the names of letters, the sound each letter represents and a list of commonly used words in print. It has been designed specifically for volunteers, who work with one child at a time, and enjoy watching the great gains that are made in only ten weeks. This program is offered to us by the Strong Start Charitable Foundation which is funded through donations from individuals, businesses, foundations and community groups. This program would not be possible without the financial support and the generous gift of time and talent from our volunteers. The Letters, Sounds and Words program is a ten week program in which trained volunteers work one on one with a child for thirty minutes each week. If a volunteer is available for more than 30 minutes each week, more students will have the opportunity to take part in the program.

Volunteer training sessions are available in two different, 2 hour sessions. Part One is available at Lynndale Heights P.S. in Simcoe on October 10th from 10am - 12pm. Part two is available at Lynndale Heights P.S. on October 17th from 10am-12pm.
