## Use goal-setting to inspire persistence

If your child is losing motivation
to do schoolwork:

- Remind her that practice is as crucial for success with reading and math as it is for scoring a winning soccer goal or playing the clarinet.
- Help her set goals for what she wants to accomplish before the end of the year. Would she like to improve at solving word
problems in math? Get all the way through a challenging book?
- Ask her to write her goals down and post them where she will see them every day.
- Have her imagine how good it will feel to reach her goals, knowing that she earned her success with her own hard work.

## The Seven Mathematical Processes- Representing

Math concepts and procedures can be represented in many different ways. Using a variety of ways to represent a concept or procedure leads to deeper understanding. Math manipulatives (physical objects students can manipulate) are particularly valuable tools to allow students to represent their thinking. They allow students to explore abstract concepts in a hands-on, concrete way. A student's concrete representations can also give the teacher useful insight into the student's thinking.

In your child's math classroom, students:
