Coin de l'immersion/Immersion Corner

Learning in and Early Immersion Program:

Just as reading in one's mother tongue depends on the ability to understand and to use that language orally, so must immersion students first develop a basic knowledge of French: In the beginning years, there is a strong emphasis on developing oral language skills (understanding of oral French, which will lead to production or speaking some French). As students develop and strengthen their oral language skills, they will be able to apply these to reading and writing. Even if you do not speak, read, or write French, you can still support your child at home. Here are some basic phonics comparisons between English and French:

- -most consonants have the same sound in English and French -vowel sounds differ significantly between English and French
- -h is always silent in French
- -an s at the end of a plural word in French is silent
- -qu sounds like K (and not kw as in English)
- -th is pronounced t
- -ch is pronounced like English sh
- -I is pronounced like long e in English (as in bee)
- -y sounds like yes, even at the end of a word
- -eau and au have the same long o sound
- -accents change the sounds of vowels

As you support your child in developing their abilities as a reader, you might consider talking about the similarities and differences in the languages. The ability to identify similarities and differences between sounds and the sequence of sounds within a word is an important skill in learning to read and write.

Student Pick-Up and Drop Off



Our school parking lot provides for a "Kiss and Drop" area for families to use in the mornings.

This area is a no-parking zone. Caregivers may stop in this zone long enough to drop off students and then continue on out of the parking

lot. The on-site parking at the school is reserved for staff parking only. Areas where signage is posted indicating a Fire Route must be kept clear at all times. Parking in these areas can result in a fine.

Student Pick -Up and End of Day Routines

All students who walk or are being picked up will now be dismissed out the exit doors by the gym. If caregivers wish to wait for students, please wait by the bicycle racks along the side of the school. Aside from the 2 permit parking spots for vehicles with an accessibility sticker, there is no parking on site for student pick up. If you wish to park and walk your child to the drop off zone, street parking is available on Coronation and Stodola Drives, in front of the school.

We have 9 large buses to transport our students. Dismissal from school at the end of the instructional day is staggered to allow for a safe exit to the buses for all children. Please note that Junior and Senior Kindergarten students who are being picked up will be at the caregiver pick up area (gym doors by the exterior bicycle racks) by 3:20 daily. Parents of Kindergarten students may pick up their children at that time. It is expected that all students will be picked up by 3:30 p.m. daily unless they are participating in a teacher supervised extra curricular activity.

Please note that dismissal time is very busy for students. It is important for families to establish a clear routine with children and the classroom teacher. If there is a change in routine, a note from the parent/guardian will be expected by the teacher **each and every time**. Families picking up children at the end of the day, should meet their child at the Student Pick-up Area (gym doors by the exterior bicycle racks). Caregivers can wait on the sidewalk there. For safety reasons, please keep the sidewalk alongside the buses clear for bus loading, refrain from leaning against buses while waiting, and ensure that little ones who are waiting with you are supervised and well away from parked buses. Thank you for helping us ensure safety for all.

Changes to Transportation

If you are not using transportation services for and extended period of time (i.e. more that a month), parents are requested to contact the school, sharp Bus Lines and GEDSB transportation office and have your child taken off the bus list.

Making Time for Math

As we look at our school data and plan for school improvement, we will continue to have an increased focus on mathematics learning. There are many ways you can support your child as partners in their development of understanding in mathematics:



*Be Positive:

Choose your words carefully. When adults say they aren't good at math-sometimes to make children feel better-they may be giving children permission to stop learning.

*Avoid math anxiety:

Math anxiety (unproductive tension and stress) is real and occurs in children as well as adults. Pressure from timed tests and the risk of failure are minor sources of math anxiety. Try not to over-react when your child makes a mistake. Makin mistakes is an important part o learning!

*Learn from mistakes:

Homework time can be a more positive experience if you help your children learn from mistakes; praise their efforts, ask them to explain their answer, ask them to think about why the mistake happened, and encourage them to try again.

*Help set the tone:

Be relaxed and engaged as your child does math homework. You are not expected to be an expert, but you can offer support and ask questions: "How did you do that?; "How do you know if you are right or wrong?"; and "Would you teach me how to do another question like this one?"

*Be patient and build confidence:

If your child becomes frustrated, stop. Remind them of things that they have already learned ow to do successfully, such as riding a bicycle or playing a musical instrument.

A Note From Our Public Health Nurse...

STOP Germs in Their Tracks – Wash your Hands!


If you have ever been sick with the cold or flu, blame a Germ! You cannot see germs but they can make you sick! The single most important thing you can do to keep from getting sick and spreading germs to others is to wash your hands. Germs can live on surfaces like desks and keyboards for up to several days. By washing your hands properly, you are reducing the spread of germs as well as being a positive role model for your children.

Stop germs in their tracks by following some of these tips:

- Wash your hands with soap and warm water for at least 15 seconds (about the length of time it takes you to sing the "Happy Birthday" song).
- Wash your hands before and after you eat, when you use the bathroom and after blowing your nose/using a tissue.
- Keep your hands away from your nose, eyes and mouth.
- Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue or sneeze into your elbow
- Stay at home if you are sick

Building Healthy Relationships

Help Your Children
Develop Empathy and
Respect:
Healthy relationships
are based on good
communication. This

are based on good communication. This involves not only language but also understanding, respecting, and caring about how another



person may be feeling. Help children understand their own feelings. Talk about how they feel when someone says hurtful things. Let them know you understand.

Children also need help to understand the feelings of others. Encourage them to watch for facial expressions and body language and to listen and respect the feelings and views of other people. Discuss their perceptions. Encourage them to help those who may not feel included and to put themselves in the shoes of others who may be affected by their actions. This can help our children build understanding and is and important foundation for social responsibility.

Accepting Mistakes as Learning Opportunities:

We learn from making mistakes. Ask your children what can be learned from a mistake that has been made. Try to focus on the learning—not the mistake. Learning from mistakes helps us to improve ourselves and our relationships. Try to help your child understand why the mistake happened and how it could be avoided in the future.

Apologies are important for young children and youth to learn. Helping young people focus on the apology can keep them from continuing to justify their mistake. Children can learn about heartfelt apologies and practice at home. Parents are powerful role models for children and youth

Winter is just around the corner. In the event of inclement weather, there is the potential for transportation delays or cancellations and school closures.

If transportation is cancelled for schools in Zone 3 AND 4, École Confédération will be CLOSED. WE ARE ZONE 4 (CITY OF BRANTFORD) AND ZONE 3 (FOR BRANT COUNTY STUDENTS). A reminder to all parents that École Confédération is in Zone 4 and Zone 3 for those living in Brant County for all bus cancellations and school closures. BUSES 503, 504, 505, AND 510 COME FROM ZONE 3 BEFORE PICKING STUDENTS UP IN ZONE 4 FOR CONFÉDÉRATION - IF ZONE 3 IS CANCELLED THERE WILL BE NO PICK UP FOR STUDENTS IN BRANTFORD ON THOSE BUSES. BUS 507, 509, 519, 528 AND 543 ARE BRANTFORD BUSES ONLY AND WILL NOT PICK STUDENTS UP IF CANCELLED FOR ZONE 4.

Please listen to Radio Station CKPC (1380 AM and 92.1) or CHCH TV.

To see if buses are cancelled due to bad weather, or fog delay, you can go directly to the transportation website from the school website or the GEDSB website (under the parents tab). Click on the "home" tab and then the "transportation" tab, and look for zone 3 & 4. Please also check the bus delay icon to see if there are any bus cancellations listed there. You will need to know your child's bus route number to see if their route has been cancelled.

Sign up for email notification from the transportation department at www.stsbhn.ca

Click on the BUS DELAY icon then hit the SUBSCRIPTION icon and sign up for email notification. This must be done every year.

In the event of a mid-day closure, the school telephone lines will be needed to work through our Emergency Phone Fan-Out to contact parents. Parents should note that it is very rare that the school will be closed half way through an instructional day.

On days of inclement weather, the staff of STSBHN and the bus companies, who provide service to our area, are actively reviewing current road conditions and future weather patterns in order to make a determination on delayed or cancelled transportation services. Information is collected from a number of sources and a decision is made and posted no later than 6:30 a.m.

As the decision to run, delay or cancel transportation is made in advance of services actually being provided, there may be some instances where variability exists in what was forecast versus what actually occurs. STSBHN and its member school boards want to provide options for the parents and students of our area and so, when it appears safe to do so, transportation services will be permitted to continue as usual. If, on an inclement weather day you feel that your child(ren) would be better off not taking the bus and either being transported into school by yourself or staying home altogether as a result of the road conditions at or near your home, STSBHN and the boards do understand and respect that this decision ultimately rests with you.

Picture Retake Day

Picture retake day will be November 23. Parents who want their child's picture to be retaken should return the order form and proofs that were sent home following the original photo day.
