Focus on Math

The Seven Math Processes

The curriculum identifies seven key processes students engage in as they learn and use math throughout the grade. These are problem solving, reasoning and proving, reflecting, selecting tools and computational strategies, connecting, representing, and communicating. Your child will use these processes when learning new concepts and procedures, practicing skills, and solving problems. Your child will also draw on his/her knowledge and skills from the five strands and make connections with real-life situations. In this month's edition, we will look at three of the processes.

Problem Solving

Students enjoy and use math when the concepts they learn make sense to them. Investigating problems builds students' understanding of concepts. It also allows students to apply their math skills in everyday situations.

In your child's math classroom, students:

tackle math problems that are appropriately challenging explore many different approaches to solving problems

Reasoning and Proving

Students need to be able to explain the reasoning behind a solution or choice of strategy. They need to be able to answer the question, "How do you know?"

In your child's math classroom, students:

make predictions test hypotheses explain their thinking 7+?=12

Reflecting

Reflecting is an essential part of good problem solving. Reflecting on their choices and results enables students to improve their approaches and discover new possibilities.

In your child's math classroom, students:

reflect on their own thinking and the thinking of others assess the reasonableness of an answer brainstorm other possible strategies share aspects of a problem that were challenging

A Note From The Public Health Nurse At Your School...Active Winter Fun for the Whole Family

Winter is here to stay for a while, but there is no need to hibernate indoors. Instead, go outside with the whole family and enjoy playing old games or trying out some new ones. Building a snowman, tobogganing, playing a game of hockey, going skating or participating in a winter treasure hunt are all great activities that will get the whole family moving.

Before heading outdoors, keep these tips in mind:

Dress warm and layer clothing. Don't forget a warm hat, mittens and boots!

Stay away from ponds and rivers. They may look frozen, but the ice may not be thick enough to support your body weight. Play it safe!

Pack a lunch and something to drink. It's easy to forget that in the cold air you can still get hungry and thirsty.

Wear Sunscreen. You can get sunburn even in the winter!

Watch for frostbite. Kids get frostbite faster than adults. Signs of frostbite include a prickly or itchy feeling in the skin, numbness and/ or discoloration on the face, ears hands or feet. Stay protected, stay warm.





Smoke-Free Ontario Act: Changes Impact All Grand Erie Schools

Last fall, the Government of Ontario passed the Smoke-Free Ontario Act, which prohibits smoking tobacco or cannabis as well as all vaping in public areas, including schools.

The new law specifically states that a person can not smoke or vape in or around a school. This includes all indoor spaces and all outdoor areas like playgrounds and sports fields. It also prohibits smoking and vaping in public areas within 20 metres of the property line of a school or School Board facility. For reference, 20 metres equals 65 feet, or the approximate length of 1.5 school buses.

A person caught smoking or vaping in a prohibited area may be charged with an offence and subject to a fine of up to \$1,000 for a first offence, if convicted.

To assist Grand Erie with this change, the local Health Unit will be providing new signage for all schools and Board facility sites. Through our Public Health Nurses, education information will be available for those looking to quit smoking or vaping. The Board will also be removing all traditional smoking and vaping areas.

Understandably, this is a significant change that will require everyone's cooperation. We don't want to see anyone charged. Therefore, we're asking for your support and assistance in ensuring everyone meets the requirements of this new law.

Student Census

From March 18-29, 2019, all Grand Erie students in Grades 4 -12 will be encouraged to complete the student census in class. The census will take approximately one class period to complete. It will include questions that ask students about themselves and their experiences, both inside and outside of school. The census findings will help Grand Erie better understand student populations and school communities; identify and eliminate barriers to student success, inclusion and well-being; and establish effective programs to increase student services.
