NOVEMBER WAS A BUSY MONTH!

During the month of November, students who demonstrated inclusiveness and cooperative behaviour were honoured with a certificate of recognition. During the month of December, staff and students at Elgin have generously donated non-perishable food items to the caring cupboard. They have also been selling popcorn for \$2 a bag, with all the proceeds (\$73) going towards the Simcoe Caring Cupboard. Popcorn sales with continue in the new year.



On December 7th, Grade 6-8 students had a very special and important presentation from Jeff and Zach from Scales Nature Park on the topic of "Reptiles at Risk." Students enjoyed a presentation and then afterwards were able to hold a variety of snakes, and view the Blandings Turtle.

We learned that snakes are cold-blooded, also known as, Exothermic and take on the temperature of the environment. They have scales and when touched, feel dry and smooth like your fingernails. Snakes have a very keen sense of smell and can smell better than dogs. They use the forks of their tongues to get scent, which is then pulled back into their mouth. Depending on the fork that has the scent, snakes know the direction of their prey.

Quite a few species of snakes are "pretenders," one of which is known as the Milk Snake. They are most often found in barns because prey, like mice and insects can be easily found. When scared, the Milk Snake will shake its tail and pretend to be a rattlesnake, making people and other predators think it is dangerous.



The Hog-Nose snake also pretends to be dangerous, so it can avoid scary situations. They are professional actors and will flatten out their neck, lift off of the ground like a Cobra and hiss loudly to protect themselves. They will strike out around you, but if contact is made, will only head-butt you with their hog nose as they keep their mouth closed. As a last resort to protect themselves, they will roll over and play dead, throw up the food they have eaten over the last few days and poop while smearing it around themselves with their tail. All of these things are to deter predators from eating them. They are completely safe for us.

Finally, we learned about the Blandings Turtle. The markings of this turtle are a yellow chin and a high domed shell that looks like an old army helmet. This turtle has been upgraded to "endangered" as of Dec. 6th, 2016. The top reason is because humans have destroyed their habitats. This species likes to live in wetlands and will walk up to 5km to lay their eggs in the springtime. The other danger for this species is being hit by a car, as their shell is not strong enough to save them from the impact. There is a turtle hospital in Peterborough, where turtle shells can be patched up to help them survive.





To wrap up the afternoon, students were able to get up close with some of the different species by holding them or viewing them. We also learned ways that we as citizens can help protect and value our biodiversity within our own community. A big "Thank You" goes out to Scales Nature Park for the informative presentation and helping us understand the importance of caring for all species within our ecosystem.
