HEAD LICE

The Head Lice season is upon us!! Please take a moment to learn some steps on how to prevent Head Lice.

Head lice spreads by close contact when heads touch during hugs, sharing secrets, play wrestling, working together and sharing objects such as combs, brushes and hats.

At King George, students have 'head checks' occasionally and our Educational Assistant staff will do follow up checks when a student has lice.


WE FOLLOW THESE GUIDELINES AT KGS:

- When a lot of nits or live lice are present, students are asked to go home and have treatment.
- When students return to school we ask a caring adult to attend for the follow-up check.
- If there are no lice or nits or a few nits, staff will identify the nits to adults and offer information about removing the nits but the student may return to class.
- If there are more nits than before or a similar amount of nits, it means there are live lice that can't be seen and the treatment has not been successful the student needs to return home.

Getting rid of lice completely can be frustrating. It means caring adults need to check their children's heads and pull out nits. This takes time and needs to happen every day or evening for a week or even longer in order to get rid of lice in your home. The treatments alone are not enough for most cases.

Tips to prevent infestation or re-infestation:

- Teach children that head lice spread by direct contact. They should keep a little distance from other heads.
- Teach children to never share combs, brushes, barrettes or anything else they use for their hair.
- Keep longer hair in barrettes, pony tails, buns or braids.
- Teach children to never share hats, caps, scarves.
- During winter months, send a plastic bag to school for your child to store hats and scarves in before hanging them on the coat hook.
- Consider adding tea tree oil or pure lavender oil to your shampoo. This method is not proven, but some people have had success with it.
- Start a head lice patrol in your home: regularly examine each child's head closely for signs of infestation; once a week is about right.



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
