Community Spotlight: Help A Child Smile

Help A Child Smile (HACS) is a non-organization in our community that focuses on children with cancer at Mcmaster Children's Hospital, at Hamilton Health Sciences Corporation. They help by providing opportunities for the children, and their families affected with childhood chance by creating chances to create fun filled memories, that last a lifetime. I sat down with Joyce Hutson, HACS' Disney Trip Coordinator, to talk about what the organization means to her, and to give you an insight on this organization.

Q: What does HACS mean to you?

A: I was introduced to Help A Child Smile in 2008 through my granddaughter Caitlin's 13-month cancer journey. When Caitlin lost her battle at the age of 5 ½, I wanted to do something to honour her memory and give back to the organization that provided her with so many opportunities to get away from the daily struggle that is childhood cancer and just have fun. So I combined two things that she loved – playing golf and all things Disney. The Caitlin Classic Family Golf Tournament was really more of a day of family fun than it was golf. We encouraged families to come out – all ages, golfers or not. Scores didn't count - we drew score cards to determine winners. Every other hole featured costumed Disney characters, such as Alice In Wonderland and the Mad Hatter. Their table was over the hole, and they were having a tea party. So the players had to putt around their feet, and the table and chair legs! At another hole, Sleeping Beauty fought a losing battle to keep Grumpy from kicking the players' balls off the tee, upsetting their golf bags, dumping their balls and tees on the ground, etc.And so it went. The day was such a success that we raised enough money to pay for a cancer child and his family to go to Disney's Give Kids The World Village in Florida for a week – all expenses paid! It still warms my heart when I recall the look on his face and the hug that little man gave me when I told him that he was going to Disney. That first experience of bringing joy to this boy and his family inspired me to want to do whatever I could to bring smiles to the faces of other cancer kids and their families.

Q: Tell us your role in the organization.

A: My initial position was Volunteer Coordinator. I enjoyed the role and had no trouble recruiting people who had a passion to help these victims of childhood cancer. As I learned more about the organization I began to realize that I had skills that could be used to improve areas of the operations and help save money as well. My years in the computer support and business worlds also afforded me a host of contacts in the community whom I knew would be supportive if asked. So I took over website development, database management, graphic design, newsletter publication and much of the merchandise supply needs. As Help A Child Smile receives no government funding and has no corporate sponsors, being mindful of our spending is crucial to our fiscal survival. Being nature and having a strong background in accounting, I began to look into other areas where we might be able to save money. I learned that we were not always getting the best prices on travel when arranging to send our families on their Florida Disney trip through a third-party agent. Reaching out to my business contacts once again, I was able to establish relationships with travel industry partners and take over the duties of Disney Trip Coordinator. That is my primary role today. Over time, some of my duties have been handed off to other Directors as they joined the Board, but I still handle the technical and graphic design issues along with making all of the Florida trip arrangements.

Q: How has the organization impacted your life?

A: What started out as a desire to remember Caitlin and say thank you to Help A Child Smile in a meaningful way has evolved into a passion for the organization and the families we serve. As Disney Trip Coordinator, I work with the families to make their experience as amazing as possible. I help them pick the date to travel, book their flights, arrange for their limo ride to and from the airport, and help them decide which theme parks they want free tickets to see! I make sure they know exactly what to expect when they arrive at Give Kids The World Village. If anyone in the family has dietary or special equipment needs I take care of that too. When everything is set, I hand-deliver their travel package which includes spending money and Help A Child Smile tee-shirts and hats for everyone. Being responsible for a family's trip is a great deal of work. I must focus on the smallest of details every step of the way. And while the family is in Florida I am on call 24/7 in case of any emergencies. For instance, one of our families was there when Hurricane Matthew hit the day before they were to leave. With the airports closed down and everyone having to shelter-in-place, changes to their travel arrangements needed to be made quickly.But along with that responsibility comes the immense joy of being a small part of this once-in-a-lifetime experience for them. Seeing the smiles on the faces of our families at our regular events such as Wonderland, Bingemans and Disney On Ice is heartwarming to say the least. But it doesn't compare to the sheer joy and sense of accomplishment when a family returns from the Village and can't wait to tell me all about their trip

Community Spotlight: Help A Child Smile

Q: What is your favourite HACS memory?

A: It seems to be such a minor thing, but to this mom, it was huge. I was to surprise her 5- year-old-daughter with her Disney trip at a fundraiser. It was going to be several months after that before they would actually leave. Mom was certain the girl would be asking constantly when they were going and be upset when told 'not yet'. So I arranged to have the little girl's favourite princess, Elsa, at the event. The two of them spent lots of time together before the big surprise. Then, instead of me doing the presentation, Elsa herself asked if the little girl would like to come visit her in her castle in Florida. Of course the child accepted excitedly. Then Elsa explained that she had some other places to go to visit other little girls so she would not be home for awhile. She said that when she got back to her castle, she would phone and let her know so she and her parents could get on an airplane the next day and come for a visit. The little girl was thrilled and agreed to wait for the phone call. And sure enough, 3 months later, Elsa called her one evening just before bed and the family was off to Florida the very next morning. Mom was so relieved and happy that it all worked out so wonderfully.

Q: How has covid-19 affected the organization?

A: Our goal is to provide opportunities for our families to gather outside of the hospital to socialize and have fun. Obviously, all of the annual events we typically host for our families had to be cancelled or severely limited. As the restrictions imposed by the pandemic remain in place, we are actively seeking new, safe, innovative ways to help our families have some fun together. We have found such adventures as online mystery sites, escape rooms and multi-player games. We have signed them up for online entertainment such as magic shows, storybook readings and character encounters. Last summer and fall we gave them tickets to drive-in movies, drive-thru experiences and outdoor activities like go-karts and mini-putt. Unfortunately, all of the Disney trips that were booked had to be postponed. From the fundraising perspective, we are finding things extremely tough. While our spending for family activities and Disney trips is down, our day-to-day expenses have not declined. In fact, 2020 saw 57 new families diagnosed - just 3 fewer than the number diagnosed in 2019. Factoring in price increases, our other programs and supports, such as paying for parking, did not let up at all. To put it in perspective, in 2019 our total revenue was nearly \$214,000 while in 2020 that number dropped to less than \$95,000. We have limited reserves, so finding new ways to fundraise is imperative to our survival past the next 12 months.

Q: Do you have any additional comments you would like to add?

A: When I first learned about Help A Child Smile, I was impressed with the fact that this long-running charity was managed by a volunteer board of directors. I was also moved by their mandate to include the entire family, not just the cancer child, in all of events they offered. Knowing that 93.7% of all money they receive is applied directly to the supports and programs for these families struggling through the childhood cancer journey confirms that working to help them accomplish their mission is just the right thing to do.


Teacher Spotlight





Planning Ahead by Eliza Stanley



When asked about advice for students thinking about taking coding Mr. Osborne said, "I would encourage everyone to try coding as having some understanding of how software/apps are developed will be a benefit to any career. There are so many languages available now and they are not all text based so there is something out there for everyone." He went to school at Northern Arizona University, University of Western Ontario, and Brock University.

Mr. Osborne and Mrs. Osborne met at PDHS when they both started in teaching 1991. Mr. Osborne is a sports fanatic. He enjoys playing and watching sports but mostly watching these days. He also spends a lot of time exploring software, programming coding languages and designing gadgets, he also enjoys doing different types of puzzles. Mr. Osborne has created many websites for his classes. He enjoys exploring different ways website can be made but has not created website outside of teaching purposes. In Computer Science they do explore the development of games, but Mr. Osborne has not created one for others to download. When asked about his opinion on cellphone use, Mr. Osborne stated, "I think cell phones are a great educational resource. However, at the same time, they can be an extreme detriment to learning as they can interfere with the consolidation of concepts. Often students get distracted with social media, games etc. and stray from the task they are working on resulting in work/tasks not being completed."

COVID has affected all of us, especially the way we are learning and teaching, when Mr. Osborne was asked how it has affected his teaching- especially with the recent lockdown he said, "COVID has resulted in a great commitment of time to explore software and techniques that may make the online experience more reflective of the learning that would occur in a face-to-face classroom. I have also put all notes, assigned work and solutions in an electronic format for students to access. As a result, this has led to some very long days." With COVID we all had to find ways to adapt some ways Mr. Osborne has adapted his classroom are he creates short video lesson so they students can re-watch the lesson as many times as needed along with notes and solutions. He also has a Microsoft Teams meeting all day for students to drop in and ask questions if needed where he can walk them through the process.

Diversity in Stem Editorial

Many people don't think of trades as jobs that are warm or clean, but the truth is that there are many jobs in materials, quality assurance and upper management that are not at all what the public normally thinks of as trades. Even with that said, work in the trades is satisfying with great pay and benefits that can be enjoyed by all genders and people. With women in many different types of jobs, the trades are an area where many people don't realize the opportunities that are out there because it isn't always presented to them.

The importance of adding more women to STEM professions is inherent. For the first time, last year, women outpaced their male counterparts for admittance to both college and university in Ontario. Many lucrative fields are gate kept behind the degree or certificate that accompanies the raises in salary and prestige that surround the professions. The fields which need gender equity the most are predominantly in the field of STEM. (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) For trades to have a flourishing growth of current knowledge, women have to be put into positions where they are comfortable on the job and knowledgeable about the many chances to grow within their fields.

More women are getting into construction and product management, but they are also moving into administrative roles in trades such as mining. Material analysis and quality control are emerging markets with many career opportunities. Many communities once had the idea that women were meant to be homemakers, which made it harder for women to enter the technological field, but over the last 20 years women overcame a lot of obstacles to get into emerging careers that would best suit them, rather than meet the society around them.

With higher requirements for technological proficiency, many women are well placed for entering the technological markets related to STEM. Future generations shouldn't question why a woman would want to get into a great career with a lot of opportunities to move upward. The changes that need to be made in the 21st century aren't just societal, they're systemic. We need people from all backgrounds and genders to consider entering trades so that there is more room for growth and productivity overall.

When someone claims that women should wear dresses and boys are taught that they're "tough" and certain jobs are "too rough for women", there is a dynamic question that lingers about why women aren't in trades. We need more diversity in many workplaces and more gender equality in great jobs so that the best people for the job are there in the hiring pools and not only the people who were already expected.

FORTY HOURS OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

Please note the following changes this year:

Grade 12's who will graduate by the end of June or Summer School need only 20 hours to graduate

All Students can use family chores since July (cut lawn, walk siblings to school, clean house, do dishes, pet care etc.)

All students can use up to 10 hours of PAID EMPLOYMENT but MUST fill in A reflection sheet along with the community involvement sheet for these to count.

Many of our students do not graduate on time because they are lacking in these hours.

Practice Test

In 2021, EQAO will be field testing an online Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT). Students have the opportunity to become familiar with the online test and its platform through EQAO's online practice test. The online practice test comprises two sessions, which include content from previous tests. The practice test is equivalent to the two sessions students will be completing during the live test. In addition, the practice test includes an introductory session that allows students to become familiar with the new online platform's tools and functions.

Literacy Test 2021

In 2021, EQAO will be field testing a computer-based assessment that comprises two sessions (Session A and Session B) containing a total of 33 questions: 31 multiple-choice questions (including technologically enhanced multiple-select questions [e.g., drag and drop, drop-down menu, checklist]) and two constructed open-response questions.
