Speaking Notes	We, Stacey Murray and Cordie Jagt, are residents of Simcoe, Ontario and parents of children attending West Lynn Public School. Ms. Murray has a child in Grade 1 and another who will be starting Junior Kindergarten in September 2024. Ms. Jagt has children in Grades 2, 3 and 6, having moved from Hamilton, Ontario during the pandemic due to housing affordability and improved lifestyle available in Norfolk County.								
	We understand the decision to amalgamate West Lynn and Elgin, through renovations of Elgin, was outlined in the Long-Term Accommodation Plan 2023-28, released in September 2023 in line with the previous approval from Grand Erie in 2016. This decision was made 8 years ago and before the COVID-19 pandemic, which has significantly altered the growth in families who are moving to Norfolk County and surrounding areas. In addition, in reviewing the Long-Term Accommodation Plan, several data points appear to be incorrect: 1) New Housing and Development In the "New Housing and Development" section on page 41, it indicates that over the growth period of 2021-2051, a total of 3,665 new housing units are expected to be developed in Norfolk Country, leading to a yield

	It should be noted that the chart above utilizes the 2018 Norfolk County study, when a 2021 study was available at the time of release. As such, the growth period is misrepresented as 2021-2051 when it is the 2006-2041 forecast that is now outdated. On page 54, the total housing units for Norfolk is indicated as 3,359,								
	understated by 306 units (3,665-3,359 = 306) from page 41. This page uses								

data from the 2021 Norfolk County study and concerns regarding these values are described below.

The unit breakdown by town on page 54 (ie 787 units for Simcoe) appears to be based on the "Residential Units in the Development Approval Process" (Figure 4-1) of the Norfolk County Comprehensive Review Growth Analysis (December 2021), prepared by Watson & Associates Economists Ltd. This report indicated 787 units for Simcoe and a total of 3,368 units for Norfolk County.

However, to be consistent with how the data was calculated for the other cities (ie Brantford), the "Reference Population and Housing Growth Forecast" (Figure B-6) of the Norfolk County Comprehensive Review Growth Analysis (December 2021) should have been used:

If the Reference Population and Housing Growth Forecast was used for Simcoe (consistent with the methodology for Brantford), the impacts on the chart on Page 54 of the Long-term Accommodation Plan would be as follows 8,300 expected new units for Norfolk County (instead of 3,359) and for Simcoe specifically for 2021-2051, the expected growth of new units would have been 2,538 resulting in the following changes (projected based on our calculations):

With the correct data being considered, 1.0 additional schools long-term would be required or 1.9 schools at peak yield, which could not be accommodated by portables. It appears as though West Lynn would be required in these circumstances and the closure should be re-considered.

It should also be considered that this is based on 2021 data and the pandemic and housing affordability changes may have further increased the number of housing units forecasted in Simcoe since this time (i.e. we wish to note the large development on the corner of Decou Rd and Ireland Rd that has not yet commenced and it is not clear whether that development has been included in the above forecast).

2) School Capacity and Utilization

On page 67 of the Long-term Accommodation Plan, West Lynn total FTE as of Oct 31/22 indicated 226 students. However as of January 2024, West Lynn has approximately 264 students and this number is only expected to increase given the new developments within the West Lynn catchment area.

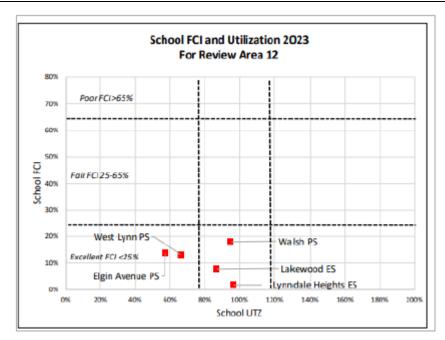
In the "Summary of Enrolment Projections 2023-2033 by Review Area" on page 64 of the Long-term Accommodation Plan, West Lynn was projected to have 223 students in 2023, 228 by 2024 and 233 by 2025. However already in 2023, we already have 264, with expected growth in the next few years.

We understand enrolment was based on summer enrolments, but an increase occurred in September, after the plan was released.

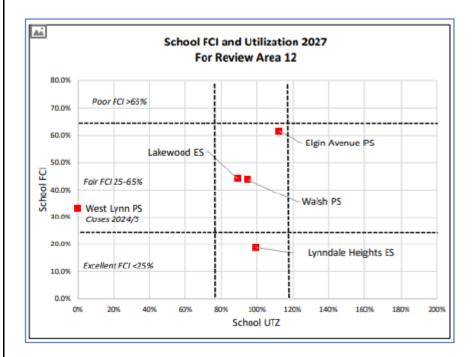
3) School Facility Condition

We understand from page 69 of the Long-Term Accommodation Plan that the Facility Condition Index (FCI) "measures the comparative cost between a facility's total required renewal and repair needs and the cost of replacing the school facility in total."

For 2023, West Lynn and Elgin both have an excellent FCI with less than 25% each:



The forecasted FCI for Elgin in 2027 (just 2 years after renovations and amalgamating with West Lynn) is 60% (on the borderline of a poor FCI) and school utilization is sitting close to 120%:



Being close to 120% capacity was based on understated forecasts. As outlined above, the current projections are higher based on higher % of forecasted growth in new housing units and higher than estimated enrolment numbers. This would suggest that we will be in an even worse spot in 2027 than indicated above (higher FCI and higher utilization).

Conclusion and Next Steps:

Based on our review, the data presented suggests that both West Lynn and Elgin should remain open with minor renovations, in order to address the forecasted growth in elementary students and keep the FCI at both schools at an acceptable level.

We request that the long-term accommodation plan be re-considered to address the following:

- 1) e evaluate the data pro ections as outlined in our report.
- 2) Consider a plan of action if utilization of the amalgamated Elgin goes above 120% and FCI increases beyond 65%.
- 3) e consider the closure of est Lynn given the data presented here.

Background

Regulation 304 "School Year Calendar, Professional Activity Days", and Policy/Program Memorandum No. 151 set out the conditions governing and establishing school year calendars and outline the following criteria that must be met:

- The school year commences on or after September 1 and ends on or before June 30;
- The minimum number of school days required is 194;
- The minimum number of instructional days is 187;
- School boards must dedicate three PA days per school year to provincial education;
 priorities and may dedicate up to four additional PA days per school year; and
- A board may designate up to ten instructional days as examination days.

Professional activities are focused on ensuring equity of outcome and well-being for all students. The three mandatory PA days must be focused on teachers' professional learning with respect to the following current provincial education priorities as outlined in *Achieving Excellence A Renewed Vision for Education in Ontario* (2014):

- Achieving Excellence
- Ensuring Equity
- Promoting Well-Being
- Enhancing Public Confidence

Note: Boards have not yet received Ministry of Education direction on school year calendars for 2024-25, nor the topics of the Professional Activity days. Until notified to the contrary, Grand Erie will proceed on the presumption that Ministry direction will be confirmed late spring.

Additional Information

The Grand Erie School Year Calendar Committee met to review and discuss proposed school year calendars that were circulated on January 9 and 23, 2024, for consideration by stakeholder groups. Committee members represented union groups, elementary and secondary Principals, Indigenous Education, and elementary and secondary parents/caregivers.

The proposed calendars presented to the committee for consideration were developed in collaboration with the Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board.

The Grand Erie School Year Calendar Committee is recommending that the board continue to operate with two calendars in 2023-24, one elementary and one secondary.

The recommended Grand Erie calendars are in total alignment with those of the Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board.

Next Steps

Upon approval by the Trustees, the draft School Year Calendars will be forwarded to the Ministry of Education. Upon final approval by the Ministry, the calendars will be shared with all stakeholder groups.

THAT the Board approve the design of the New Caledonia Joint-Use Elementary School for release of tender documents.

Background

In November 2021, the Grand Erie District School Board (Grand Erie) received an announcement from the Ministry of Education indicating that it would receive capital funding for a new 441 pupil place elementary school along with a three-room childcare centre (1 infant, 1 toddler, 1 preschool) to address accommodation pressure in Caledonia. This will be a joint use school with Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic DSB, which will result in a facility of 746 pupil places.

In April 2023, Grand Erie received confirmation that the floor and site plan for a childcare centre license have been reviewed and approved in principle by the Ministry of Education pursuant to Section 14 of O. Reg. 137/15 under the *Child Care and Early Years Act*, 2014.

In January 2024, the Ministry of Education provided the board with an Approval to Proceed (ATP) to tender the project.

Project Scope:

The new build, which will include approximately 76,000 square feet of constructed space, will include the following construction scope for Grand Erie:

- 3 Kindergarten classrooms
- 15 regular classrooms
- 2 Specialized Services Spaces
- Shared use of a 7,400 square foot gymnasium
- Shared use of an 1,800 square foot library/learning commons.

The site plan application, as well as the building permit applications, are both currently underway. The schematic drawings are attached as Appendix A: 3D Rendering and Appendix B: Draft Floor Plan.

Budget Implications:

A cost consultant was engaged to review the project drawings developed by Svedas Architects and provided a Class A cost estimate to ensure the project cost is within the Ministry's ATP funding allowance. In the opinion of the architect, it is assumed that the Cost Consultant report utilized a relatively higher square foot construction cost estimate in their calculations when compared to similar projects in the sector.

Estimated project costs are aligned Ministry of Education approved allocation.

This project has been funded through the Ministry of Education's Capital Priorities and Child Care Capital Funding Program. Currently, no additional reserves have been allocated to this project. However, should the tender results reveal a budget pressure, the Board will have three options:

- 1. Review alternate pricing and re-structure components so the project fits within the approved project funding.
- 2. Utilize internal, Board-appropriated reserves for any cost overruns. The balances of Board reserves as of August 31, 2023 are:

RE: Request for Additional Perspective on Bill 98 from Rural School Boards

I hope this letter finds you in good health and high spirits. I am writing to you as the leader of the Superior-Greenstone District School Board, representing our community and the dedicated educators and staff who serve within our district. We commend your ongoing commitment to education and your tireless efforts to improve the educational landscape across the province of Ontario.

We understand that Bill 98 holds great promise in further enhancing the quality of education in our province. It is evident that your vision for education is founded on principles of inclusivity, collaboration, cooperation, and relationship-based leadership, which are values we deeply resonate with and strive to uphold within our school board.

While we acknowledge the significant progress we have made in our initiatives to support students, we believe it is essential to offer a unique perspective from small, rural school boards like ours. Our district encompasses a rich tapestry of communities, including 13 First Nation communities, Nokiiwin Tribal Council, Nishnaabe Aski Nation (NAN), Matawa Tribal Council, Aninshnabek Nation, Anishnabek Education System (AES), two Treaty areas, unseeded territory, and three Metis Nation Councils. Additionally, our student demographic is close to 40% First Nations, Métis, and Inuit (FNMI).

Our unique context and realities demand special attention when regulations of such significance as Bill 98 are adopted. We believe that the achievement data within many rural school boards, where students predominantly achieve at level 2 and have done so for several years, underscores the urgency of thinking differently about educational strategies for our students. Attempting to implement initiatives designed for larger, more urban centers may inadvertently hinder our ability to make the necessary changes and improvements for our students.

One of our primary expectations as a school board is to foster meaningful connections with the families we serve. We understand that building these relationships is a crucial aspect of our commitment to total inclusion for students and our core values of collaboration, cooperation, and relationship-based leadership. However, we acknowledge that this endeavor presents unique challenges, as many of the families within our district face busy schedules, socio-economic hardships, and a lack of trust in traditional parent engagement initiatives. Bringing them information such as the three Ministry Priorities and student achievement data may negatively impact the work that we have done to date to build relationships with families to promote engagement in our schools. Currently, the families we serve are not focused on data and school board priorities, but on managing the complexities of daily life. We need to more fully understand the rationale for this expectation as it has not been identified as a need in our district.

Our primary focus is on students' needs. Within our community, there is an impression that this legislation prioritizes political and economic considerations. In addition, stakeholders have shared they do not have a clear and transparent understanding of key details and future implications of this legislation and have shared their concerns that this legislation has the potential to negatively impact our communities.

In light of this, we respectfully request that you consider the following as you look to implement the various components of Bill 98:

- 1. Inclusion of Rural Perspectives: We advocate for the inclusion of perspectives from small, rural school boards during the implementation of Bill 98. Understanding our unique challenges and opportunities is paramount to ensuring the success of this legislation.
- 2. Tailored Initiatives: We recommend that initiatives under Bill 98 be adaptable to various educational settings, with provisions for rural communities, to ensure they effectively meet the needs of all students, including those in our district.
- 3. FNMI Representation: Given our significant FNMI student population, we believe that additional leadership and resources are essential to address their specific needs and create a more equitable educational experience.

We firmly believe that by working collaboratively and taking into account the diverse needs of all communities, we can achieve better outcomes for Northwestern Ontario's students. We are committed to contributing our expertise and local knowledge to help shape the implementation of Bill 98 in a way that truly benefits all students across our province.

Thank you for your time and consideration. We look forward to the opportunity to engage in a dialogue with you and your team to further explore these recommendations and ensure that the educational future of all Ontario students is bright and inclusive.

RE: Supporting Students with Special Education Needs

Dear Minister Lecce,

The special education budgets in many school boards across the province are overspent year after year, yet the needs of students are not always being fully met. This is not because school-based personnel fail to recognize the needs of these students. It is because there is insufficient staff in the schools to implement programming effectively. This leads to growing gaps and frustration for the students as they try to deal with individualized challenges without the support they need. Increased levels of support would most certainly decrease acute behavioural and mental health struggles. Moreover, consistent levels of support for our students early in their schooling would potentially avert later, more significant struggles.

As per our mandate, the PVNC Catholic Special Education Advisory Committee is actively making recommendations on matters impacting the establishment, development, and delivery of special education programs and services - specifically focusing on providing recommendations to update the funding formula that would help serve our students with special education needs. We would ask you to explore three recommendations specifically tied to financial resources in order to update the funding formula to better serve these students. In addition, we have provided 2 other recommendations for review, that the SEAC committee believes, if adopted, would benefit students with special education needs. Please review and consider the following recommendations:

Many students with special education needs are not able to access a school bus in the same way most children do. This could be because of self-regulation issues, anxiety, physical disabilities, etc. This is an equity issue. They deserve the same access to transportation that the students who are able to take the regular school bus have. The current funding for this issue is tied to students taking smaller buses. For boards with a large geographical area and rural components, such as ours, these small buses are



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unavailable; we must rely on taxis and vans to transport these students. The 196 students in our Board with special transportation needs generates \$98,000 of funding while costing our school board \$1,256,000 - a gap of well over a million dollars.

Supervision of elementary students during lunch and recesses is largely the work of educational assistants in many school boards. In PVNC Catholic, elementary teachers complete 80 minutes of supervision per week, as well as working with students, contacting parents, preparing lessons, extracurricular activities, etc., during these scheduled student break times. This results in the bulk of the supervision completed by educational assistants. Our school board currently receives \$300,000 per year to cover all elementary supervision for the year. We encourage you to review the actual cost to school boards in this area, including the cost of covering lunch and breaks, and fund at a more realistic amount.

A portion of funding for special education is often linked to the SIP process and formal testing and diagnosis of students. This means that only students with severely unsafe behaviour or clear medical diagnoses would qualify for enhanced funding. Formal testing of students who are clearly struggling academically, behaviourally, or socially but are not a significant safety risk often takes a significant period of time to occur. There are long waiting lists in school boards for psychometric testing. This results in students with clear needs not being tested, and hence funded, until at least the junior years of elementary school. As a result, we encourage you to continue additional funding for assessments and enhance the allocation of targeted funds through SIP.

Furthermore, this lack of funding is especially apparent for children entering kindergarten. We see students arriving to ELKP with communication, toileting, behavioural and cognitive lags with little or minimal community support in place. It often takes months to work with parents/guardians to begin exploring the child's needs and development through medical and community-based professionals. With no enhanced funding for these students, personnel has to be pieced together to assist these students. This lag in funding results in insufficient personnel to meet the needs of these students during their first five to seven years of schooling. Without the appropriate level of funding for the help they require, these students often fall further behind academically and socially. We encourage you to examine this funding in order to help all students reach their potential. Though early identification of language and math issues is a step forward, it is unrealistic to believe that remediation and intervention can happen without the additional personnel to implement these programmes.

Currently, the Ministry of Education, Ministry of Community and Social Services and the Ministry of Health often operate within their own silos, with communication and collaboration of services being extremely difficult if not impossible in some cases. Increased collaboration and communication, including fostering the involvement of



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community professionals with specific expertise to support students from their respective discipline should be a priority in our system. Seamless coordination and communication between each respective Ministry would allow a more timely, comprehensive, and effective delivery model.

Students with caregivers who struggle with transportation, booking/ keeping appointments, mental health impediments, etc. would have those barriers removed. Priority care to students and families would more effectively be delivered with enhanced coordination and communication by all.

Another area where the lack of integration between ministries negatively impacts our students with special education needs is when they prepare to transition from secondary school into the workforce. Targeted funding for these students, beyond traditional school co-op placements, could lead to greater connections and training through the involvement of community organizations. Additionally, if employers were incentivized to invest in these students and retain them as employees following the completion of placements or volunteer hours, this could lead to an increase in opportunities for employment for these individuals as they transition into adulthood.

Our committee believes that updating funding and addressing gaps in coordination and communication to deal with the challenges mentioned above is crucial to the success of our students and the balancing of the special education budget. We encourage you to work to address these needs in order to allow each of our students to benefit fully from their experience in Ontario's school system.

Whereas the proliferation of gambling advertising, particularly during sports telecasts, has resulted in an alarming number of children and young adults becoming addicted to gambling;

Whereas gambling can lead to significant harm, including runaway debt, stress to families, low self-esteem, anxiety, depression, and even suicide;

Whereas Statistics Canada has estimated that 1.6% of adult gamblers, more than 300,000 Canadians, are at moderate to high risk of gambling disorders; and much information on the insidious result of these advertisements can be found at BanAdsForGambling.ca;

Whereas school boards across Ontario and beyond are dedicated to preserving and improving the mental health of students.

That Bluewater District School Board assert that it supports a legislative ban on advertisements for gambling in Canada in all media, one of the objectives of the Campaign to Ban Ads for Gambling (BanAdsForGambling.ca).

That Bluewater District School Board send a letter to local MPs, MPPs, and provincial and federal political leaders to advocate that legislation be enacted to ban advertising for gambling in all media.

That Bluewater District School Board forward this resolution to OPSBA for dissemination.

With the proliferation of gambling advertisements, and their potential negative impact on students, Bluewater District School Board is adding its voice, among other advocates, to urge action to address a pervasive issue in Canada. We recognize that any measures to implement a legislative ban on gambling related advertising falls within the jurisdiction of our provincial and federal political leaders. By calling on our governments to enact appropriate legislation that applies to all media across the

country, we are aligning with our board's strategic plan priority of a safe supportive learning community that works together to support wellness.
