Crosswalk Safety



Drivers - including cyclists - must stop and yield the whole roadway at pedestrian crossovers, school crossings and other locations where

there is a crossing guard. Only when pedestrians and school crossing guards have crossed and are safely on the sidewalk can drivers and cyclists proceed.

A school crossing is any pedestrian crossing where a school crossing guard is present and displaying a school crossing stop sign.

Drop Off Reminder

If students arrive after the bell has gone, they are to enter through the front doors and sign in at the office. Students who arrive before the bell are to join their classes on the North side of the building to line up and enter the building. Students who

attempt to enter the front door before the bell will be directed to the side door to alleviate traffic at the main office.



A Note From the Public Health Nurse at Your School... Protect Your Brain! Wear a Helmet!

Bicycle riding season is just around the corner! Remember to keep yourself and your children safe on every ride by wearing a bicycle helmet that fits properly and by following the rules of the road. Here are some helpful tips:

- Before buying a helmet for yourself or your child, make sure it meets the correct safety standards and has a safety sticker from one of the following organizations: CPSC, Snell or ASTM
- Make sure that the helmet fits properly! Visit Parachute Canada, <u>parachutecanada.org/resources</u>, for instructions on properly fitting a helmet
- If a helmet has never been in a crash and is not damaged in any way, it needs to be replaced every five years
- If the helmet has been in a crash or is cracked or damaged in any way, it needs to be replaced immediately
- Remember different activities may need different helmets. If you are unsure whether or not the helmet is safe for the activity, check with the company that made the helmet!

You are your child's best role model. Role model safe behaviours by wearing a properly fitted helmet yourself. You only have one brain. Protect it by wearing a helmet!


Focus on Math

The Seven Math Processes

This month's Math Focus concludes our focus on the math processes. Communicating mathematical reasoning and understanding is an important component of math learning.

Communicating

Communicating one's thinking and reasoning is an essential part of math. Through communication, students share and develop their understanding. Over time, students learn to use this language precisely and effectively.



participate in many conversations with the teacher, and with other students, in which they ask questions, share and clarify ideas, compare strategies, draw conclusions, and explain their reasoning. Everyone's thinking is valued and considered communicate their math thinking orally and in writing



The following are samples of questions that support the development of these math processes.

Problem Solving: What is happening in this problem? What am I asked to find?

What do I know that I can use to solve this?

Reasoning and Proving: Why does this make sense? How do I know my solution is right?

Reflecting: How else could I have solved this problem? What did I learn from doing this work?

Selecting Tools and Computational Strategies: Which tool could I use to measure...?

What strategy could I use to show...?

Connecting: This concept reminds me of... This problem is similar to...

Representing: What does this diagram tell me? What equation can I use to show this?

Communicating: How can I explain my strategy? Here is how I figured this out...

Mme. Hunter heard their conversations and saw a teachable moment. She spoke of 9-1-1 as a number that people can call when they need help and made a personal connection to her sister who is a 9-1-1 operator. The class also spoke about the role of police officers in keeping people safe and helping those who are in trouble.

This real life learning experience prompted lan to want to thank the police for the work that they do. In the end, lan persisted and went to the Police Station with his parents to present an officer with a Tim Horton's gift card. We are very proud of lan for his persistence and his self-advocacy. I'm sure that he made this particular police officer's day with his gratitude.
